I do not miss rush hour in Austin. But interesting things did happen when I was stuck with my kids in the snarl. I still remember the conversation that came up one gridlocked evening when my teenage daughter, Anna, decided to play me a video that was setting the internet on fire. "Just listen, Mom. Then tell me what you hear. It will either be 'Yanny' or 'Laurel."



She hit play and waited, watching me carefully.

"You hear 'Laurel,' right Mom? Right??" I glanced over at my child. She had to be pulling my leg. Because I did NOT hear "Laurel." A weird digital voice was saying "Yanny."



full time staff member, engaged in community outreach, that we receive as a gift!

We applied for a grant to obtain an outdoor, inflatable screen and projector system
and were approved! This will allow us to both hold outdoor worship services in our
fields (to supplement those indoors, especially during COVID) and host family and
community movie nights in our recreation fields. I'm so excited to be approved for
this grant money and for how it will extend our ministry to new people in the
community.



- Exciting news! The UMC in our area have received a grant to support immigration and refugee ministries. Susan Hellums has reached out to see if they would reallocate those funds towards supporting local students with an immigrant background. We have received clearance to work with STC to provide \$500 scholarships and a laptop valued up to \$1000 for 48 students! What a blessing!
- A member of our church, knowing how tight the budget has been, offered an
 amazing gift. Starting this month and going through 2021, they have negotiated
 lawn care and pest control with vendors they use and will be paying the bill! This is
 an enormous blessing to us and such a gift to FUMC. Many thanks to this
 anonymous donor and their generosity.
- October financial numbers are in and we're better. We were still over budget, but only by \$3,700. We are starting to see the effect of those hard budget choices and I'm hopeful as we move forward.
